

Colors, Copiers & Changes

It may not immediately stand out to users of the Foley Center Library, but there is a big change this year; new MFPs (Multi Function Printers). Introduced at the beginning of fall semester, these machines can print, copy and scan and email.

In the past, many different third parties have owned, operated and maintained the printing processes in Foley Center. There was some dissatisfaction among library users stemming mainly from machine malfunctions. This year the library decided to take

control of the printing process, and so far things are running great.

The old system used a generic print card the user would have to add money to and keep track of. The new system, Pharos, allows the Gonzaga community to keep a balance on their GU ID card. This should not get confused with Flex money or Bulldog Bucks; printing is a separate account that is also tied to the GU ID card. This money can be used both in the library and in the College Hall building computer lab. All the library

research terminals are connected to the new machines. There is a color and a black & white MFP on the main floor of Foley Library and a color machine in the Administration offices.

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Nethercutt Reading Room Dedication

On Tuesday, November 6, 2007, the George Nethercutt Reading Room will be dedicated in the Foley Center Library. Former Congressman George Nethercutt and Gonzaga President Robert Spitzer will attend the ceremonies.



Nethercutt was a Republican member of the United States House of Representatives from 1995 to 2005, representing the Fifth Congressional District of Washington. He was first elected to Congress in 1994, when he unseated the Speaker of the House Tom Foley. He was appointed to the House

Appropriations Committee and the House Science Committee. He successfully won reelection for the next four terms. In 2004 Nethercutt ran for the United States Senate but lost to the Democratic incumbent, Patty Murray. Currently he is working with the political lobbying firm of Lundquist, Nethercutt & Griles, LLC.

Following his last term in office, Representative Nethercutt donated his papers to Gonzaga University. A section of the third floor in Foley Center will be named in his honor to recognize his dedication to public service and the donation to Gonzaga. The reading room will house some of his office furniture and two display cases of memorabilia. His papers will be stored in the Special Collections Department and serviced there. People using the library will be permitted to use his desk and chair.

Shifting Gears

Looking for a book, journal, or newspaper and can't find it? A lot of physical shifting has been going on throughout the library. The item you want is still here, but you may need to ask us for help in finding it.

On the main floor, the US government documents have been shifted and tidied up, eliminating unnecessary large gaps on the shelves, and creating some gaps where things were squished. On the second floor, the C-DS sections of the library's main print collection, as well as the HC-HV and QA-QZ sections have also been shifted, making the shelves less cramped.

On the lower level, the shifting is still in progress. Last spring, all of the periodicals on the east side of

the lower level were consolidated from two long sections of stacks into one section, to create a space for several new IT offices. If you haven't visited the folks in IT, you should take a look at their new home. This past summer, the paper copies of several journal titles that we also subscribe to electronically were removed from both the east and west sides of the lower level, making room for the entire Periodicals collection to be stored on the west side of the floor. Not all of our Periodicals collection is in place on the west side yet, but we are gradually shifting titles over there.

The location of the newspapers and current journal issues has also changed. The stacks holding the current journal issues of all titles we have in paper form were removed last spring. The tables holding the newspapers, which used

to sit amid these stacks, has moved next to the Periodicals Desk, with the older issues now placed on the curved shelves around the corner from the new newspaper location. The current issues of our most popular journal titles can still be found under the windows in the general reading area on the lower level, where the current issues have always been located. We have 79 titles in the current area now, but that number is subject to change as we subscribe to new titles and receive feedback from patrons about which journals they would like in this area. A list of the Current titles is posted at the Periodicals Desk. The current issues of all other titles are filed by call number in the stacks, along with older issues of the journals.

Exhibit to Celebrate Gonzaga's 120 Year History

To celebrate Gonzaga University's 120 years of existence, a special exhibit of photographs, clippings, and memorabilia of Gonzaga's history is currently on display in the Special Collections Reading Room at the Foley Center Library. "Inspired by an Enduring Mission: Gonzaga's First 120 Years, 1887-2007" shows the development of Gonzaga from a small, rural college to a large university. The items came from the Gonzaga University Archives.

Highlights include:

- Original leather bound register with the names of the students who attended the first year
- 1903 Gonzaga College Cadet Corp Officer Hat
- WWII Distinguished Flying Cross from a GU alumnus in the V-5 Naval Program
- Freshman beanie from 1954
- Films: 1935 football game against Washington State College; Campus Days 1952, 1953, 1954, and 1955; and the dedication of the Crosby Library in 1957

The exhibit can be viewed weekdays 9:00 a.m. – noon and 1 p.m. – 4:30 p.m. It is located in the Cowles Rare Book Library, third floor of Foley Center, and will be open through January 29, 2008.

On May 22 - May 24th 2007, Theresa Kappus, Foley Center Library’s Distance Education Coordinator and Kelly Jenks, Library Instruction Coordinator undertook a trip from Gonzaga through Kelowna and on to Prince George, British Columbia, a distance of 650 miles from campus or to quote Theresa, “Way the heck up there!” The purpose of the trip was to deliver library instruction to off-campus graduate students at three locations in Canada. While Foley librarians have traveled to deliver instruction since 1988, we believe this is the farthest ever ventured for a class.

Over the years, the Distant Services librarians at Foley Library have taught classes in Victoria, Esquimalt, Nanaimo, Kamloops, Penticton, Castlegar, Hobbema AB and other locations in Canada as time and budget allows – usually about 2-3 trips per year, serving 4-6

locations and typically 18-20 students per class. Distant students truly appreciate these on-site visits where they learn how to use the online databases and other resources with a librarian present to answer questions. As librarians, we feel it’s vital for our off-campus students to make these human connections to Foley Library, and it’s fun for us to share what we know. In addition to teaching the important class content, we also like to share a little Foley fun by bringing along Foley Library pens and other giveaways (we refer to this as the Far Flung Foley Fling!). We look forward to these visits where we meet students in their local communities, emphasizing our willingness to help and stressing the support that’s available to them through services such as 24/7 chat reference, e-mail and the library’s toll-free number. After all, helping the Gonzaga community make the most of

the library resources is our mission, regardless of where their part of that community is located.

A typical presentation on these visits takes about two hours. One hour of demonstrating the resources and a second hour of helping students do research with a break in between. At the break we took the opportunity to ask the students about the red-colored trees in the forests that we noticed in abundance as we drove north. We were told that the pine beetle is responsible for the damage both to the trees and consequently to the local economy – a very sobering thought for those of us living near pine trees. The research portion of the class proceeded uneventfully until Kelly got locked out of the school while retrieving something from the van. Nothing like a bit of comedy to close out a successful teaching session!

E-Resource Update: SPORTDiscus

Foley Center Library is pleased to announce the latest addition to our collection of full-text online databases available to faculty, staff and students: SPORTDiscus with Full Text is a comprehensive resource for sports and sports medicine journals, providing full text for more than 350 journal titles. With full-text coverage dating

back to 1985, this database provides excellent coverage of the journals relating to all areas of exercise science, sports, and sports medicine. Did you know.....about WINborrow?

Foley Library is participating in a new regional resource-sharing service, designed to provide easy access to materials beyond the walls of Foley. Academic, public, and school libraries throughout the Inland Northwest, including Whitworth University, Community Colleges of Spokane, North Idaho College, Coeur d'Alene Public Library and Gonzaga University, have created WINborrow, a free service that allows anyone with a Gonzaga ID card the ability to borrow books from any other participating library. Students, faculty and staff can walk right into any WINborrow participating library and check out their books. Users can also place holds through WINborrow online, right from the Foley Library online catalog. To get started, go to <http://foley.gonzaga.edu>, and click on Library Catalog. Click on the WINborrow link, and then select one, two or all of the regional libraries to search from. Click Connect, and then do a search like you normally would for a book in Foley Library. The system will tell you which area library has the book and if it's available to check out. Users can place a hold for the book and have it delivered right to the Foley Library, or they can drive over to the participating library and pick up the book.
