Put together by the recently formed Digital Collections Unit, the project is part of a library effort to collect, scan and make available images and documents regarding Gonzaga's history and activities. The first completed set put forth by the unit is a miscellany of photos of the Gonzaga campus and Gonzaga people from the year of its founding in 1887 through July 2008.



Other collections-in-progress currently available include the George R. Nethercutt Collection, Gonzaga University Buildings and Spires. The Foley Digital Collections page will soon sport a link to a form for Gonzaga faculty, staff and students to suggest inclusions of other collections. The display features 29 books that have been recently banned at school libraries, public libraries, and institutions of higher education in the United States. the books and their unflattering labels, consider this: is there any legitimate reason for banning a book?

The banned books display is located on the first floor of Foley Library and will be available for viewing through October 1, 2008.

Database Junkies

Foley Center Library now offers more than 100 online databases for use by students, faculty and staff. [Check out the Databases by Subject page on the Foley Library website](#) to see the range of available databases. Two of the newest databases are highlighted below.

LexisNexis

LexisNexis Academic is a premier academic database. It provides access to full-text news, business, and legal publications, using a variety of flexible search options. LexisNexis includes access to over 6,000 news, business, and legal sources. The outstanding news coverage includes deep backfiles and up-to-the-minute stories in national and regional newspapers, wire services, broadcast transcripts, international news, and non-English language sources. Wide ranges of business information from a variety of core sources make this an invaluable tool for keeping up to date with current business information. Students and faculty can also use the Company Dossier module to retrieve detailed company information and financial performance measures or identify and compare companies matching specific criteria. Lexis Nexis also provides access to Shepard's

Citations, a caselaw citation validation service.

Cabell's Directory of Publishing Opportunities

Cabell's is a specialized database purchased to assist the faculty and graduate students in their scholarly publishing efforts. Cabell's provides the user with one stop shopping when determining what journals might be appropriate for publishing research. These directories provide current information on what prospective authors would need to identify places to publish, including scope/coverage, acceptance/rejection rates, number of reviewers, time required for review, availability of reviewers' comments, fees charged to review or publish the manuscript, copies required and manuscript topics as well as contact information. The directories cover the fields of education, business and psychology.

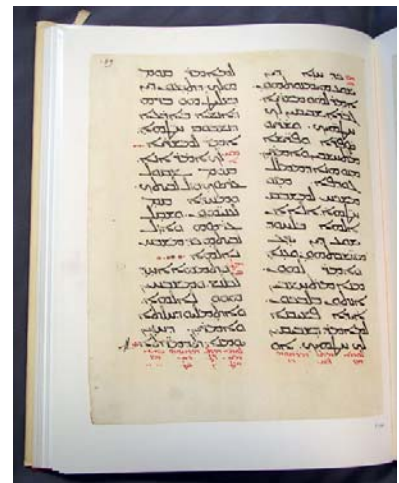
The Gospels in Nez Perce: The Evangelizing Work of Fr. Joseph Cataldo, S.J.

*On display in the Cowles Rare Books Room,
located on the third floor of the Foley Center Library,
October 1 through December 31, 2008*

Catholic missionaries in the Northwest Territories continued the Judeo-Christian tradition of translating the Gospels into the language of the native peoples, so that they could hear the scriptures in their own speech. Thus Father Joseph Cataldo quite naturally translated the Gospels into Nez Perce, and he and his fellow Jesuits also produced other biblical translations into native languages, as well as catechetical materials and hymns. This two-part exhibition presents a sampling of this evangelical translation work and also shows the historical tradition of such translation, from the Septuagint through the Nez Perce translations.

This exhibit was arranged by Dr. Catherine Brown Tkacz, Guest Curator. The Northwest Digital Archives were indispensable to the research underlying this exhibition, and David Kingma has had a critical role in the project.

Lower Level Redesigns & Redefines

In partnership with the campus Information & Technology Services (ITS) departments, the Foley Center Library continues the redesign of the lower level that was started well over a year ago. Over the summer, library staff shifted eight additional rows of periodicals stacks, opening up space for the new ITS Administration Offices. Periodicals have now been split up, with journals in the A-E call number range on the east side of the lower level and journals in the F-T call number range on the west side.

The lower level redesign has also allowed space for the creation of a combined IT Service Desk/

Library Periodicals Desk. Staffed by both IT and library regular and student workers, the move is an effort to be more accessible and available for student computer issues, such as password help, wireless issues, and the need for network cables. An IT representative will be present at the new shared IT Service Desk/Library Periodicals Desk from 7:00 am until 9:00 pm Monday through Friday. They will also have staffing Saturday from Noon until 5:00pm and Sunday from 10:00am until 5:00pm. However, these hours are subject to change, based on student needs.

Cell Phone Facelift in Foley

Foley Center Library has long been known as a place to study, do research, and work on group projects, but increased cell phone use in the building has been getting in the way of this. In response to these concerns, a new cell phone policy, with specific rules regarding where cell phones can and cannot be used, has been created. Earlier this summer, the library's Public Services department formed a committee to look at the cell phone policies of other college and university libraries, in order to develop a policy that addresses the issues:

"No Phone Zones" now include each floor of the library along with



the stairwells in the middle and on either side of the building. If you must take a call while you are in the library, please be respectful of those around you. Take your call out to the glass atrium, into the 24-hour study lounge, or into one of the group study rooms on the second floor. These are the **only** approved places for talking on your phone. Backpacks, laptops, and all belongings should be taken with you if you choose to make/take a call and leave. Items left unattended are prime targets for theft.

The Foley Library staff encourage the use of text messaging in lieu of talking on cell phones while in the library.

In response to student concerns about noise in the library, we require all patrons to place their cell phones on silent or vibrate mode, and to conduct their conversations outside the library. Please take your belongings with you if you leave your study space. You may also leave belongings at a staffed service point while you are gone.

Cell phone use in Foley Center is limited to the Atrium outside the main doors of the library, the 24 Hour Study Lounge, and the Group Study Rooms (when no one in the group objects). Text messaging is acceptable in the library, as long as it does not cause a disturbance.

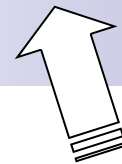
