

FEDERAL CAMPUS SECURITY ACT

The “Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act” was originally enacted in 1990. It was amended in 1998 and is commonly known as the Clery Campus Security Act. Two goals of this legislation are disclosure of criminal activity on campus and timely warning of criminal activity. Gonzaga University strongly supports these goals. Our crime reporting procedure, coordinated through the Campus Public Safety & Security department and Student Life office, insures that criminal activity on campus is effectively tracked and reported.

The Act requires annual reporting of the number of specified criminal offenses that occur on campus (or other specified areas) reported to the Security department and/or local police, as well as information about campus security policies and procedures. The reporting period is January 1-December 31 of each year. The statistics for the most recently completed calendar year, as well as the two previous years, must be released in a report by October 1 of each year. Specific provisions of this law stipulate that all students, staff and faculty of an institution receive this report. In addition, the crime statistics are reported to the Department of Education and published on a website (see below).

The 1998 amendments continued the requirements of disclosure of criminal incidents on campus reported to Campus Security and/or local police, as well as information about campus security policies and procedures. The required reporting area was widened to include adjacent public property and non-campus property that is directly related to the institution’s educational purposes. Criminal incidents in University residential facilities are required to be listed separately. In addition, a daily crime disclosure log requirement was created. This log lists criminal incidents which occur on campus and other specified areas on a daily basis and discloses particular information about the location and nature of the incident. The Campus Public Safety & Security department maintains the log. The log is available for viewing in the Security office during regular weekday hours upon request.

The crimes covered by the Act are murder, manslaughter, sex offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, and arson. Statistics for the reported incidence of these crimes must be included in the yearly report. Arrest statistics and campus disciplinary referrals for liquor law violations, drug law violations and weapon law violations must also be reported. In addition, statistics must be provided for criminal offenses of murder, forcible rape, and aggravated assault (and any other crime which involves bodily injury) that manifest evidence of prejudice based on race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity or disability.

The Act was amended again in 2008 as part of the Higher Education Opportunity Act. Additional requirements were mandated related to the Security department’s working relationship with local police, hate crime reporting, and emergency notification to the community in the event of a significant emergency or dangerous situation. Other portions of the HEOA created new requirements related to missing persons and fire safety on campus. The Department of Education has advised that negotiated rulemaking, leading to new regulations, will take place in the near future. The rulemaking process and regulations will guide all colleges and universities in complying with the HEOA.

HATE CRIMES (7): No hate crimes meeting Clery Act criteria were reported in 2007, 2006 and 2005.

Notes: Column Headings as defined by the Clery Campus Security Act:

- (1) "CAM" Campus means any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution and used in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls. Column (1) includes incidents listed in column (2).
- (2) "GUR" Residential facilities owned and operated by Gonzaga University and used for housing students. Includes all residence halls on the campus plus rental houses in the immediately adjacent Logan neighborhood owned by GU.
- (3) "APP" Adjacent Public Property means all public property that is within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area as the institution, such as sidewalks, streets and other thoroughfares, and parking lots.
- (4) "RNC" Reportable Non-Campus means any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution (Bozarth Retreat House, Crew boat house, Ministry Institute).

Other notes:

- (5) Includes sexual assault with an object, forcible fondling (sexual assault), sodomy
- (6) Limited to incest and statutory rape
- (7) Reported crimes which are listed above, or which involve bodily injury, reported to local police agencies or to a campus security authority, that manifest evidence that the victim was intentionally selected because of the victim's actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, or disability (Clery Act definition).

Data for the yearly disclosure of crime statistics is gathered from Security reports, information provided by the Student Life office and inquiries made of the Spokane Police department. Additionally, regular inquiries are made of other University departments and officials who have significant responsibility for student and campus activities. A Student Life professional with expertise in the Clery Act prepares the report. Computerized databases are used to sort and arrange data.

For ease of reference statistics reflect incidents reported as occurring on campus, adjacent public property or reportable non-campus property, as defined by the Clery Campus Security Act.

- (1) Incidents which manifested some evidence of discrimination based on race, color, religion, ancestry, ethnicity, national origin, gender, sexual origin, or mental, physical, or sensory handicap, but which did not fit the definition of a crime under Revised Code of Washington (see below), or the FBI UCR definition of a hate crime.
- (2) Malicious Harassment is defined by RCW 9A.36.080. (See this code section for full definition):
 - (a) Causing injury to the victim or another person; (b) Causing physical damage or destruction; or
 - (b) Threatening a specific person or group of persons, and placing that person, or group of persons, in reasonable fear or harm to persons or property because of race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, or mental, physical, or sensory handicap.
- (3) Includes obscene, threatening, nuisance, and multiple hang up calls
- (4) Unauthorized entry of a vehicle for the purpose of committing a crime (theft, vandalism, burglary, etc.)
