- ❖ Advising student government and other campus organizations
- ❖ Offering leadership development opportunities
- ❖ Serving as a resource for faculty
- ❖ Establishing and improving relations with the local neighborhood

CAMPUS PUBLIC SAFETY & SECURITY

The Campus Public Safety & Security office is located in Welch Hall, lower west side. You can call Security at extension 2222 on campus or 313-2222 from outside phones. Security officers patrol campus 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Services include: response to calls, coordination with local emergency providers, follow-up on incidents, vehicle, bike and foot patrols, crime prevention and awareness, escorts, jump starts, office and residence hall room lock-outs.

Gonzaga University, in compliance with the Federal Campus Security Act, prepares and distributes an annual report which describes certain policies and gives statistics on the number of specific crimes and arrests, which have occurred on campus or other specified areas. The annual report is available on-line via the Student Life website. Paper copies may also be requested by contacting the Security office and Student Life office.

Parking management and pass distribution is handled through the Security office. For more information call the Parking Message Line at extension 4147, or 313-4147 from outside phones.

CAMPUS SERVICES

The office of Campus Services is the primary contact for most scheduling needs, assistance with technical support, room set-ups and reservations, for almost every building on campus.

Reserving Space: To request the use of campus facilities, please contact the University Scheduler at extension 6854. All reservations can be made using our automated system, on-line at <http://schedule.gonzaga.edu> and following the Express Request link.

Please plan ahead as a facility usage agreement form must be obtained from Campus Services for the use of most of the campus facilities, and takes two weeks on average to approve.

Requesting Event Support: Support for events and activities may be obtained with a minimum of a one week's notice. To schedule both technical and non-technical support for an event please contact the office of Technical Support at extension 6855.

Video Production: Campus Services now has a video production department. We can videotape your guest lecture or performance. Our post-production department will edit it, duplicate it, and can now put it on the Internet or YouTube. The video team is available for shooting various projects and can also do shoots with green screen footage and add visual effects. If your department or club needs a promotional video, Campus Production can do that

COUNSELING CENTER

Students entering the Counseling Center are seeking answers to questions concerning many and various aspects of their lives; such as their personal relationships, study habits, overindulgence issues, as well as the age old questions: who am I and what can I do with my life to make it as productive as possible for the greater good?

❖ **OUR COUNSELORS** are all Professionals, each possessing years of experience in their field and are therefore well qualified to address the individual needs of the student and to do so in a short-term, “focused” type counseling. The Counselor assists the student to clarify their life goals —personal, academic and professional— and also in acquiring and developing methods for coping with obstacles encountered throughout life. During the first session, while becoming acquainted, you and your Counselor will determine the best way The Center can serve you. Succeeding sessions will be devoted to finding ways of achieving the goals that have been established.

❖ **CONFIDENTIALITY**

Visits to The Center do not become a part of your Academic Record; your identity and your conversations with the Counselor and any disclosures made during your 50 minute appointments are kept strictly confidential. Confidential information will not be shared with anyone outside The Center without your expressed, written consent, unless there is a clear and imminent danger to yourself or another.

❖ **CAREER COUNSELING** is a basic function of the Counseling Center wherein you have the opportunity to work with a Counselor who will help you with the ‘journey inward.’ This process would likely entail completing the Strong Interest Inventory and the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator, and using the SIGI computer career exploration program as tools to examine your life in terms of developing a career plan. Personal agency (being self-aware and actively developing your own potential) is the message we relay to students as we assist them in developing realistic strategies to get them where they want

to go. Once a career plan has been developed, we refer students to The Career Center to help prepare for the 'journey outward.' The Career Center will assist you in the process of finding internships, developing a resume, practicing interview skills, and networking with others in your chosen career field.

❖ **SPECIALIZED SERVICES**

Occasionally, students have concerns that may require Specialized Services; Our Counselors can serve as Consultants in the processing of referrals to appropriate Community Professionals. Some concerns for this Specialized Service include: alcohol rehabilitation, family therapy, eating disorders, chronic psychological conditions, long-term therapy, and learning disabilities.

The Counseling Center is located in CG 303 and we can be reached by phone at extension 4054 or by calling 313-4054. Our office hours are 8:00 am to 12:00 pm and 1:00 pm to 4:30 pm Monday through Friday.

CROSBY STUDENT CENTER

The Crosby Student Center is central to many activities, events, and services. If you wish to schedule a meeting room, please call the University Scheduler at extension 6854. To schedule vending space, or if you need assistance with set up of an activity on the main level, lower level, or formal lounge, please contact the Manager of Crosby at extension 6858.

Stop by the Crosby Cafe for a "tall, double latte." If you are hungry for a snack or a quick meal, check out the Café a la Cart, or the Cherry Blossom. Need cash? We've got an ATM and a US Bank branch office for your convenience. Meeting space is also available in one of four meeting rooms, with seating capacities from 10 to 30. Have a little extra time on your hands? Relax in front of the big screen TV, impress your friends at the keys of our baby grand piano, or enjoy a game of ping pong. Be sure to visit our student photography gallery located upstairs in the formal lounge. Don't leave just yet, there is still more to do. Don't forget to pick up your package or mail at the University Mail Services, then grab a snack from Crosby Info desk or some aspirin for that late-night study headache. For nostalgia buffs, we also house the Crosbyana Room, the world's largest public collection of Bing Crosby memorabilia. Just when you thought you'd done it all, there is Ticket Central where you can get tickets for concerts, movies, campus and community events. At the information desk you will find candy, gum, ice cream, Bing Crosby souvenirs, and many gift items for that someone special.

If it's business you need to conduct, offices located in the Crosby Student Center include Gonzaga Student Body Association (GSBA), Student Activities, University Ministry, Gonzaga Activities Board (GAB), Graduate Student Advisory Council (GSAC), Residence Hall Association (RHA) Advisor, Orientation, Gonzaga Outdoors, The Career Center, Weekend Wonders and G.A.M.P.

DEAN OF STUDENTS AND STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

The Student Life Leadership Team consists of the Vice President for Student Life, the Dean of Students and two Assistant Deans of Students. Each member of the team is a student affairs professional, responsible for overseeing the health and well-being of Gonzaga students and insuring that students experience caring concern in the Jesuit tradition of "cura personalis". Members of the Student Life Leadership Team assist students in crisis situations, insure that students' needs are addressed, and support students in seeking the help of other campus offices. The Dean of Students serves as the Chief Judicial Officer for the University. Members of the Student Life Leadership Team work from the Student Life office, College Hall 120, extension 4100. All students are welcome!

DINING SERVICES AND MEAL PLANS

Campus Dining Services has designed a comprehensive dining program that offers a computerized meal card system with the flexibility and convenience of several locations. The following is a list of meal plan options:

There are (6) meal plans offered for the 2009-2010 academic school year: Platinum, Gold, Silver, Bronze, and Copper (lunch), Copper (dinner). Carte Blanche Dining Plans allows students unlimited access to the main dining room, the "Marketplace," during different times of the day and provides a certain amount of Dining Dollars to spend at any Campus Dining location. The Block Plan provides a certain number of meals that can be used within the semester at "The Marketplace" plus the flexibility of Dining Dollars. Dining Dollars are cash values included in all of the meal plans. They are utilized just like cash on your card. This money cannot be used in the Bookstore or other non Campus Dining locations. All plans are only for the meal plan cardholder use.

For the students on the block meal program, one meal will be deducted from your total each time you enter the Marketplace. Block meals are to be used only in the Marketplace. They have no cash equivalency.

Dining dollars may only be used in campus dining locations and does not include the bookstore. Dining dollars carry over from Fall Semester to Spring Semester when you purchase another meal plan. You can also use them to pay for pizzas from two local pizza companies. Bulldog Bucks is a prepaid cash account which allows faculty, staff, students, and administrators to purchase meals and snacks anywhere on campus and also at several off campus participating merchants stores. General Dining Information

Can I have friends who don't live here eat with me?

Visiting friends and relatives are welcome to join you for a meal on your block meal plan. If you have a Carte Blanche meal plan, you can pay for them with your Flex Dollars, with cash, or zag pass.

How do I use my meal card?

You must bring your meal card with you to all meals; you may not enter without it. Cards being used by someone other than yourself are not permitted and will be confiscated and reported to the Student Life Office for action.

What do I do if I lose my meal card?

In order to enter the dining room, you must have an active Student Identification card. If you lose your card, you may get a new card from Student Accounts and contact the Dining Services office.

What can I take out of the Marketplace?

Only what you brought in. If you are caught removing dining room property, you will be referred to the Student Life Office. Dining services does provide a "take out" meal program for those students whose restrictive class schedule prevents them from having time for lunch. These meals must be pre arranged with the Marketplace manager.

What if a group wants to have a meeting with refreshments or a meal outside of the dining room?

There are several rooms available for special occasions and meetings, which can be reserved through Campus Services, extension 6854. Contact the Campus Dining Catering Office for more information at extension 6902.

Resident Dining Committees

Do you want to have more to say in your food service program? The Resident Dining Committee meets twice a month. The meeting and dinner are hosted by the dining service and run by the RHA. If you are interested in attending a meeting, please let your hall council representatives know.

Food service is not provided during Christmas Vacation and Spring Break. Special three-day weekend holiday schedules will be posted around campus.

GONZAGA OUTDOORS

An outreach of the Student Activities office, the Gonzaga Outdoors program is a resource for students interested in participating in and learning about outdoor recreation. Guided outdoor excursions such as rafting, hiking, or skiing trips are offered to students on a regular basis throughout the school year. We also offer various educational workshops addressing skills and safety. Trips and workshops have limited space, and are available to all students on a first come, first serve basis. In addition to our low-cost guided adventures, we seek to aid the independent outdoor enthusiast by providing a variety of equipment for rent at very reasonable rates. Our inventory of quality, well-maintained rental equipment includes snowboards, snowshoes, backpacks, tents, camp stoves, sleeping bags, kayaks, and various accessories. We also provide some shop services such as bicycle tune-ups and alpine ski tuning.

If you are already an experienced outdoors person or are just interested in discovering something new, we are here as a useful campus resource to help you best take advantage of the excellent outdoor recreation available in our area.

The Gonzaga Outdoors office is located in the lower level of Crosby Student Center and can be reached at extension 4189.

HEALTH/MEDICAL RESOURCES – HEALTH CENTER

Gonzaga operates an on-campus Health Center which is a walk-in ambulatory health care facility located at 704 E. Sharp above the Housing Office. Our focus is to provide health care education and primary medical care to students so they can return to their educational endeavors as quickly as possible. Please schedule an appointment for a visit with a physician or registered nurse practitioner by calling extension 4052. All records are maintained in a separate confidential file. Specific services include:

- ❖ Appointments with doctor or registered nurse practitioner
- ❖ Wellness Education with an emphasis on self responsibility.
- ❖ Treatment of injuries and illness (i.e. suturing, wart treatment)
- ❖ Diagnostic testing (i.e., blood tests, strep throat, mono)
- ❖ Immunizations are available for measles, hepatitis A & B, meningitis, tetanus, HPV and influenza
- ❖ Medical supplies (i.e. crutches, splints, and slings)
- ❖ Follow-up care and referrals

All students are eligible for services. Fees that may be incurred are the responsibility of the student. Fees may be submitted by you to your insurance carrier.

Family Medicine is on-call 24-hours at 624-2313. For emergencies call 911 and then notify Campus Security at extension 2222. Taxi service is available for urgent care by calling the Gonzaga operator.

LGBT RESOURCE CENTER - SEXUAL ORIENTATION SUPPORT GROUP INFORMATION

Gonzaga University, through the Office of Student Life, takes seriously its obligations to create a safe supportive educational environment for all students, including those who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgendered (LGBT) in their sexual identity. Gonzaga's approach to sexual orientation is drawn from the Non-Discrimination Policy, the Commitment to Human Diversity, Catholic Social Teaching, and a commitment to helping students develop their whole selves. The University seeks to affirm and support our LGBT students by providing, upon request, a confidential support group for gay and lesbian students who seek to understand their sexual identity or receive support from students who understand the rigors of living as a LGBT person. OFFICE OF HOUSING AND RESIDENCE LIFE

The Office of Housing and Residence Life is concerned with the operation and management of University owned residential properties both on and off-campus. These include traditional residence halls, on and off campus apartment units, and off-campus houses.

Students entering their third year or above qualify to rent off campus properties. The University offers apartment-style living and limited houses for rent to Gonzaga students. Applications for off-campus housing are available at the Office of Housing/ Residence Life. For more info call extension 5887.

In addition to traditional leasing business conducted for the University, Housing and Residence Life strives to provide a thematic approach to the administration of most of the housing facilities under its control. Peer residence life staff members provide a variety of social, educational, and recreational opportunities and programs throughout the facilities and serve as in-house administrators of the facilities. A comprehensive administrative approach is undertaken in order to fulfill the mission of the University with regard to out-of-classroom learning in all realms of human development. The Housing section of this handbook is devoted to issues of housing assignments, roommate selection, facility maintenance and renovations, and description of rules unique to the responsibilities students have when living on campus in University-owned and operated residential property.

The Office of Housing & Residence Life is located in the lower level of the O'Leary Hall at the corner of Sharp and Dakota. Office hours are 8:30a.m. to 4:30p.m., Monday through Friday, except for University holidays. Our telephone number is 313-4103 or extension 4103.

The staff of Unity House assists Gonzaga University in developing and expanding its commitment to recruit, nurture and retain students, faculty, administrators and staff of diverse backgrounds. It is our mission to empower students to become leaders on the university campus as well as in their communities.

Unity House offers a safe space for all built on trust, honor and respect where students can come to feel comfortable. It is a home away from home for many students. We have a full kitchen, meeting rooms, a computer lab, cable TV, and space for cookouts. The Unity House is open to all students and serves as a meeting space for numerous student clubs, support groups and community organizations. It is a comfortable place to study, learn new things, make new friends, relax as well as engage in intellectual dialogue with students with diverse perspectives.

Unity House provides on-going programs throughout the year such as Summer BRIDGE, a bi-monthly speaker series, academic and career building workshops and evening study tables during mid-terms and finals. Other social activities include BBQ's, game nights, and potlucks. Under the Division of Student Life, the Unity Multicultural Education Center shares in its commitment to help students achieve their maximum potential and to improve the quality of campus life which allows us to expand our reach beyond academics and into all aspects of a student's life. ATHLETICS

Martin Centre

The Martin Centre consists of more than 83,000 square feet of indoor training space which houses the majority of the offices for the Athletic Department. The Martin Centre includes two basketball or volleyball courts, a golf practice area, an athlete's weight room, locker rooms, and an athletic training room. The Martin Centre is the home of the Gonzaga University Volleyball team and is primarily used for Gonzaga Volleyball games and other athletic team practices.

McCarthy Athletic Center

The McCarthy Athletic Center, built at a cost of 25 million dollars, was completed in October of 2004. The arena features a seating capacity of 6,000 and is the home of the Men's and Women's basketball teams. The McCarthy Athletic Center contains two 9' x 16' video walls and two 100' video ribbon boards. The arena also includes six luxury suites, a new club room containing 9 TVs, 5,000 sq. ft. of training and meeting space for the crew teams, new office space for a portion of the Gonzaga athletic department and the men's and women's basketball staffs, four visiting locker rooms and 40 points of sale at 6 permanent and 6 portable concession stands.

Rudolf Fitness Center

The Rudolf Fitness Center is a 38,000 sq. ft. facility with a full line of cardiovascular and weight areas. Also available are four racquetball courts, two aerobics rooms, three basketball/volleyball courts, a 1/11 mile running track, a six lane 25-yard swimming pool, and a smoothie snack bar.

Students, faculty and staff, and spouses must have their valid GU ID card to gain access to the Rudolf Fitness Center. Graduate and Law students may purchase a semester membership through the Student Accounts Office in College Hall room Q24. For more information about memberships call extension 4200. BOOKSTORE/CAMPUS STORES

DISABILITY RESOURCES, EDUCATION & ACCESS MANAGEMENT (DREAM)

Disability Resources, Education, & Access Management (DREAM) provides access to Gonzaga University's programs, services, activities, and facilities for qualified students with disabilities in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and Washington State laws. DREAM may arrange or provide appropriate academic adjustments, reasonable accommodations, auxiliary aids, assistive technology, advocacy, and other types of assistance for students with disabilities.

Students should contact DREAM to inquire about the procedure for securing academic adjustments or accommodations. Students must contact DREAM at least four weeks prior to the semester for which they are requesting services. However, DREAM continuously evaluates student documentation and requests for accommodation through the school year.

If at any time during the process of application, admission, and enrollment, individuals feel that they have been discriminated against because of a disability, they are encouraged to notify the DREAM Director. Incidents which have occurred more than 120 days prior to making the complaint may or may not be given consideration. To obtain copies of GU's Informal Complaint Process for Reasonable Accommodation or the Formal Grievance Procedure, please contact the DREAM Director.

FINANCIAL AID

FOLEY CENTER LIBRARY

The Ralph E. and Helen Higgins Foley Center is home to Gonzaga University's main library. All students registered at the University, as well as faculty and staff, are entitled to use library materials and services. For all library information call extension 5931.

- ❖ **REFERENCE SERVICES** – Librarians are available to assist students in research and in using the online and print resources of the library. Assistance is available in person, through online chat, by email and by phone.
- ❖ **RESERVES** – Material placed on Reserve by Gonzaga faculty are available at the Foley Circulation Desk. Reserves circulate for two hours, one day or three days, as directed by the instructor. Laptops are also available for checkout at the Circulation Desk.
- ❖ **CIRCULATION PRIVILEGES** – Library books circulate for 28 days and may be renewed in person, by phone or through the library catalog. Fines are assessed for overdue and lost items. Unpaid library fines will result in a hold on transcripts and/or future registrations.
- ❖ **ID CARDS ARE REQUIRED FOR ALL LIBRARY TRANSACTIONS** including printing and photocopying.

The Gonzaga Alumni Mentor Program (GAMP) is a career development and networking program designed for Gonzaga University students and alumni. It works by matching students and graduates with a mentor in an industry related to their academic major or career field. The primary goal of the program is to establish a relationship between the mentee and mentor that facilitates better career decision-making and the development of a network that results in increased career opportunities.

GAMP has alumni and friends across the country waiting to assist students and graduates in their career planning or job search. They are available to provide information, give feedback on career plans and job search strategies, and when appropriate, to provide job leads or referrals. Although contacts made through the program may lead to job opportunities, GAMP is not a job placement or referral service. Instead, GAMP facilitates the exchange of information, development of professional contacts and the sharing of personal experiences and interests of its participants.

In addition to mentor matching, GAMP's Trek program plays a valuable role in student and alumni career development. The Treks are primarily career development and networking programs designed to increase the visibility of Gonzaga University students and alumni in key metropolitan areas across the country such as Seattle, Portland, New York, San Francisco and the Silicon Valley. The goal of the Trek program is create opportunities for our students to network with alumni and employers in their home region or the region they hope to work in following graduation. This makes the Treks an excellent vehicle to bring employers together with Gonzaga students

and alumni. Each year, a number of successful pairings are made via the Treks, resulting in permanent positions, summer employment and internships.

HOGAN ENTREPRENEURIAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

ISP processes the application and admission of International undergraduate applicants, and English as a Second Language applicants, while also communicating with MA/TESL applicants. ISP serves as the University's evaluator for international secondary and tertiary transcripts. ISP ensures the University's compliance with federal regulations pertaining to international visitors and students, provides immigration information, international student advising, orientation, and intercultural activities.

INTRAMURAL ATHLETICS

Gonzaga has a rich tradition of intramural sports. MAIL SERVICES

Mailboxes are available for students in the Crosby Student Center located in the lower level of the Crosby Building. Students living on campus need to have a mailbox in order to receive mail and packages. Mail is distributed to boxes daily by noon except Sat, Sun, and major holidays. We offer stamp sales, USPS, UPS, Fed Ex, and shipping materials. We do not sell Postal money orders. The mailroom accepts cash or checks **ONLY** for all transactions.

Mailboxes may be kept for the entire time the student is in school **OR** the student can reserve their box during summer breaks or when studying abroad at no cost. There is **NO** sharing of mailboxes. The key deposit is refundable when the student checks out. Student mail is forwarded for 1 year after checkout. The mailroom's extension is 5697. Please note: mailboxes rented from the University may not be used to operate a business through.

PLANT AND CONSTRUCTION SERVICES

This department provides services to the Gonzaga University community through the maintenance, repair, and general upkeep of all the campus facilities and grounds. Plant Services also responds to work requests when these types of services are needed. Students may submit

work order/service requests for minor maintenance, repairs, cleaning, etc. via e-mail by writing Customerservice@plant.gonzaga.edu or by calling (509) 313-5656. Response to requests may take up to two or three days unless it is considered urgent.

Plant Services' office is located at the west end of campus west of the Dussault apartments.

REGISTRAR'S OFFICE

The Registrar's Office is responsible for maintaining student academic records and insuring the accuracy and confidentiality of such records in accordance with institutional and federal regulations. Administration of registration, off-campus programs, grade processing, degree requirement evaluation and conferring of degrees, certification of Veteran's benefits, degree verification and verification of enrollment for loan deferments /good student discounts are major functions of this office.

Students are encouraged to report academic concerns about registration, grades, degree audit, etc. to the Registrar's Office as quickly as they are identified for assistance in resolving situations that can become serious if left unattended.

RESERVE OFFICERS' TRAINING CORPS (ROTC)

The United States Army maintains an ROTC Military Science Department at Gonzaga University. The ROTC program is a cooperative effort between the Army and the University to develop the future leadership of the Army and the nation. Students are offered an opportunity to earn a commission as a Second Lieutenant and serve their country in either the Active Army or the National Guard/Army Reserve. Cadets incur no obligation during the first two years of ROTC unless on scholarship and will enroll in a wide variety of leadership development classes, leadership laboratory, and other activities. TUTORIAL SERVICES

- ❖ The Writing Center strives to serve all writers in the academic community at Gonzaga University. The main goal of the Writing Center is to provide free, non-credit learning support for student writers of all abilities as they produce writing for audiences in curricular, co-curricular, and pre-professional settings. The tutoring philosophy entails treating every student with respect and approaching each tutoring session as an opportunity for facilitating critical but sensitive dialogue about students' writing processes and writing. Toward this end, students are welcome to visit the Writing Center at any stage of their writing project, including brainstorming, drafting, revising, and proofreading. While the Writing Center is not an editing service, tutors are available to help writers develop strategies for self-editing. In addition, the Writing Center's website (www.gonzaga.edu/writingcenter) provides the tutoring hours and online resources for writers. Students may come to the Writing Center by their own choice and by instructor referral. The Writing Center is located just inside the main entrance of the Foley Center Library.
- ❖ The Mathematics Lab provides free tutorial assistance to Gonzaga University students needing help on all levels of math. It is staffed by qualified students and/or math professors. The lab is open seven days a week and most evenings. The specific hours and who will be available to provide help during these times will be posted on the door to the lab. Hours vary each semester. The math lab is located in Herak 224.
- ❖ The Communication Arts Lab provides 12 Macintosh computers. This lab is utilized for instruction for all Communication Arts writing courses and is available to all Communication Arts students when not being used by classes. The lab is located on the fourth floor of College Hall.

OFFICE OF UNIVERSITY MINISTRY

Mission

The Office of University Ministry is responsible for the faith development of all students regardless of religious affiliation and tradition. University Ministry provides opportunities and resources for spiritual growth and fellowship through retreats, service projects, liturgies, music ministry, Christian Life Communities (CLC's), spiritual direction, residence hall programs and more. These activities offer students a more mature understanding of Gonzaga's Jesuit and Catholic identity and a deeper respect for other religious traditions.

Activities

Mass and Sacraments:

As a Catholic University, we practice rituals on campus to unite us as a faith community. At least four public Liturgies are available each day in the Gonzaga community. People of all religious paths are welcome to join us in prayer and worship. In addition, we help students connect with other local area places of worship.

Not only are students invited to come to Mass, but they are also invited to take on leadership positions, such as that of Eucharistic Minister, Lector, Server, or Sacristan.

University Ministry also offers students the Sacrament of Reconciliation three times each week. In addition, a student may seek out a priest at any time.

Retreats:

University Ministry's retreat programs provide opportunities for students to practice reflection, self-disclosure, leadership, fellowship and self-examination according to our Ignatian heritage. More than a thousand students participate in University Ministry retreats each year.

University Ministry coordinates one Pilgrimage, six Freshmen Retreats, four SEARCH retreats, four Cardoner Retreats, one Senior Retreat and three Montserrat Retreats per academic year. Each retreat is coordinated by a University Ministry staff member and most are led by student crews.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

GONZAGA STUDENT BODY ASSOCIATION (GSBA)

GSBA provides a forum to bring leadership, justice, faith, service, and ethics together. Every undergraduate and graduate student is a member of the Gonzaga Student Body Association. We address a broad range of student initiatives and concerns, and seek solutions by working with the student body. We provide leadership for the development of the Gonzaga community through the sponsorship of clubs, activities, student legislation, and open forums.

Three branches constitute student government at Gonzaga :

- ❖ The executive branch of GSBA is led by the student body president and a cabinet. Each class also elects a president and vice president who serve on the Executive Council along with other student leaders in GSBA and Residence Hall Association. An executive staff of appointed students supports the organization and the student body, and coordinates the Gonzaga Activities Board.
- ❖ The legislative branch is vested in the GSBA Senate. Twenty four representatives are elected to this continuous body; sophomore, junior, and senior senators elected in the spring and freshmen, off campus, on campus, non-traditional, and international senators in the fall.. Meetings are open to the community, and any student can write bills for senator sponsorship. The Senate debates important student-initiated legislation. The Senate also handles all issues ranging from money allocation to social justice to academics.
- ❖ The Judicial Board is an active body of students who review the constitutionality of legislation, adjudicate disputes, provide educational information, and serve as a peer-review board in student conduct cases. Through each of these outlets, GSBA works closely with the Office of Student Life and the Office of Student Activities to provide opportunities for student involvement.

GSBA offers a variety of ways for students to be involved. These include active participation in Senate meetings, held each week, or through one of GSBA's clubs and organizations. In addition to these opportunities, elections take place every Fall and Spring semester for Senate positions and officer positions, respectively. The GSBA Street team, appointed by an application process, is a volunteer group of approximately 25 students who work directly with the Gonzaga Activities Board (GAB) to produce, promote, and facilitate events on campus. GSBA also coordinates input to the administration on behalf of the student body in the form of the GSBA President's Council. Students on GSBA President's Council are appointed in the fall to serve one-year terms on University committees which develop policy in academics, student life, athletics, and budgeting. All meetings of the student government are open and guests are always welcome.

GONZAGA ACTIVITIES BOARD (GAB)

The Gonzaga Activities Board is the programming arm of GSBA. It is comprised of seven students: the GAB Coordinator, Dances and Concerts chair, Coffeehouse chair, Performing Arts & Lectures chair, Weekend Events chair, Community Events chair, and Campus Acknowledgment of Multicultural Opportunities (CAMO) chair. In conjunction with the Office of Student Activities, GAB coordinates the planning and execution of all GSBA-sponsored events from free Coffeehouse shows, to lectures, concerts, homecoming, and everything in between. The Gonzaga Activities Board is dedicated to providing quality entertainment and educational opportunities for the Gonzaga student body. Suggestions for events or specific performers are welcome, please contact the appropriate GAB chairperson and let them know.

Below is a brief summary of the positions.

- ❖ GAB Coordinator: Oversees the individual chairs and the programming budget.
- ❖ Dances and Concert Chair: Responsible for booking and producing concerts and several dances on campus.
- ❖ Coffeehouse Chair: Books a variety of talent for a free showcase, such as music artists, comedians, or open-mic nights.
- ❖ Weekend Events Chair: Sponsors free or low-cost programs on the weekends to provide entertainment opportunities for Gonzaga students both on and off-campus.
- ❖ Community Events Chair: Responsible for organizing three week-long event series: Fall-Fest, Homecoming, and Spring Bling as well as overseeing the GSBA service initiative. Provides discounted student tickets available in the Crosby Student Center to events taking place in the Spokane community such as movies and theater performances.
- ❖ Campus Acknowledgement of Multicultural Opportunities (CAMO) Chair: Coordinates programs that promote and recognize Gonzaga's diversity of interests as they include, but are not limited to: background, nationality, religious affiliation, sexual orientation, ethnicity, political beliefs, and values.
- ❖ Performing Arts and Lectures Chair: Arranges various thought-provoking presentations such as visiting lecturers, film screenings, and various theater performers.

RESIDENCE HALL ASSOCIATION (RHA)

The Residence Hall Association (RHA) is the student governing body for the entire Gonzaga Residence Hall system. RHA was established to promote the interests, needs, and concerns of residence hall students within the greater University community. This organization has two main pillars: programming and advocacy. It upholds these initiatives by putting on social, educational and community building events, offering opportunities for student leadership development, and serving on various university committees.
