


## What Is Native American Studies and How Does It Complement My Career Goals?

Gonzaga offers a 21-credit interdisciplinary minor in Native American Studies and when you enroll in courses for the minor, you will develop

- An informed comprehension of Native American histories and distinct Native American experiences
- Insightful consideration of varied Native American social, cultural, and political perspectives, including contemporary community priorities related to cultural preservation, environmental conservation, and economic development
- A deeper understanding of ancestral and contemporary Native American communities here on the Columbia Plateau and Gonzaga's intellectual and spiritual connection to this homeland


There are more than 570 federally recognized tribes in the United States. Twenty-nine of these tribes are in Washington State, and five tribes are within a two-hour drive of Gonzaga.

Native American Studies at Gonzaga is built upon the study of Native American sovereignty—the inherent right of tribes to self-govern and to advance cultural and political priorities in accordance with tribal values. Native Americans and Native communities share many common historical values and contemporary priorities, but there is no single 'Native American perspective.'
