Something you learned at Gonzaga that you've carried with you throughout your life:

This fall my siblings and I are cruising the Danube . Next Easter,I am walking the Camino de Santiago with a group of 60-70 year old friends from Seattle and Spokane. I enjoy painting in water colors. I like to read, work in the garden, play golf when the weather is good, enjoy aerobics and line dancing classes, watch the Bulldogs play at McCarthy when I can get tickets and go to Vegas for the WCC tournament. I love to see alums there. 
Memories of your life at Gonzaga:

Memories of your life at Gonzaga:

Coming to Gonzaga from Montana I worried I might have a California roommate (I did). The blend of cultures created a wonderful GU spirit that has lasted fifty years. At Gonzaga, religious ed turned into theology; rote learning became questioning and Fr. Richard Twohy opened up big-picture ideas. Memories of your life at Gonzaga:

I wrote in an application for grad school that my mind had "exploded" at Gonzaga. When I came to GU, I was a jock (and a decent student) without a clue. As a result of friends and teachers there, my life possibilities expanded. As a result of a paper I wrote for Franz Schneider about W. B. Yeats, I realized that a life could have purpose and direction. Inspired by an assignment from Thomas Rukavina (initially I would not have chosen but am grateful that I was required to take 6 philosophy classes), I wrote my "ethical philosophy of life") that has guided (and grown with) me since. I had the honor to sit in literature classes with John Sisk, who used to sit on the window sill smoking his pipe and (from my view) saying the most amazing things. I will never forget the times I spent with my roommate (and life-long friend) Mike McGonigle. I loved playing intramural sports, meeting girl friends in the library (or at Spokane Falls) and staying up late in the dorms talking to friends.

Something you learned at Gonzaga that you've carried with you throughout your life:

Gonzaga changed my life. I became a more thoughtful reader and writer. I was introduced to books, ideas and issues that still haunt me. From a racially and ethnically diverse Seattle neighborhood, I was perhaps innately disposed to care about racial justice. The war in Vietnam expanded my concerns for social justice--and shaped my subsequent scholarship, teaching and activism. These concerns were the focus of dorm discussions, summer reading and, while not the subject of any class that I took, GU helped me see these issues within larger context. I carried away from Gonzaga perhaps three main messages: the world is complicated, I have a role to play (Franz Schneider told us we needed to take a stand)--and, in light of these two, be humble. I remember a Halloween party (my junior year, I think) where we decorated the dorm basement as a graveyard, each person with a marker and epitaph. Mine was "Here lies Dick Hill who died trying to be articulate." Still trying.

Earned Ph.D. in American Studies from Emory University in 1976 (Atlanta, GA)

Taught 41 years (1976-2017) at Concordia University (Portland, OR) in Humanities and English

I loved teaching, the energy of the classroom and the curiosity of students. Features of my teaching included rigor, classroom community building and issues exploration through discussion, care for students and social justice concerns. I attribute all of these to my education at Gonzaga. I always thought of my teaching career as "paying it forward" for wonderful teachers at Gonzaga like Richard Twohy, Thomas Rukavina, Franz Schneider and John Sisk (among others).

I was married twice to two wonderful women. My three children, 5 grandchildren and one great-grandchild (listed above) are the pride of my life. Not listed above due to space, I also have 2 step-children (and their 3 children) that I love.



Following graduation from GU, I went to work for PT&T in California in data systems management. After about 5 years, I left the company, spent some time abroad and returned to the Pacific Northwest, going to work for PNB in Seattle, again working in data systems. I met my husband, Dave while working there and we were married in 1975. With the pending arrival of our first child, I left the work force and took on a much tougher job of stay at home mom. I spent the greater part of the late 70's, 80's and early 90's being a wife and mother and loved every minute of it. With college looming and 5 kids to help get through, I decided I needed to reenter the work force. I enrolled in Community college taking accounting classes and updating my computer skills. After several part time jobs, I went to work in the office of our Parish Church as the office manager and bookkeeper for both the church and parish school. I retired after 16 years, in 2012. My husband retired from his job the same year. We enjoy our individual hobbies and together we do some travelling, work in the garden, spoil grandchildren and talk about how proud we are of our greatest achievements, our kids.

I wrote "2X=4, X=4". Professor:"sloppy algebra". I got a "D" in the class. Hockey, baseball and basketball teams. I'd like to see a rematch with Weber State now. Concerts: Righteous Bros (we applauded, hoping for an encore, finally quit, realizing they were on the plane home), Bill Cosby, Chad Mitchell. I still regret not seeing Louis Armstrong.

Something you learned at Gonzaga that you've carried with you throughout your life:

I learned a lot about the value of good friends, the ones you knew you could count on: Best friends: my roommate Jim Jahn '68, RIP 1969, Fort Lewis; and Bill Swanson '68, RIP 2014; and my fellow engineering students, who helped me more than I was able to help them. I hope I was able to "pay this forward" by helping my colleagues during my working career.

I received an excellent education in Civil Engineering (emphasis structural analysis) from Dr. Dar, Mr. Serbousek, Mr. Bush, and Dr. Laak that prepared me for my career.





I picked GU out of a book about colleges. When I arrived in Washington I had no idea how to pronounce either Spokane or Gonzaga. I spent the night in the "WOMEN'S ONLY" Monica/ Catherine dorm. The following day I was introduced to cafeteria food, Freshman beanies, the capacity of Peggy Mullen's VW Bug, and the thrill of new-made friends using water balloons against a common "enemy" (Sophomores). I introduced myself as "Jose" or "Fifi" and began my wonderful, occasionally lonely, eye opening, liberating, entertaining, educational Gonzaga experience. I attended GU on a partial scholarship, as did Connie, Colbert, Nick, Zeke, Gail, Shirley, Ben, Chuck, Larry and Bob. We were the only African Americans in the student body. In my first four months I often wondered "why am I here?" Luckily, in January I started playing women's basketball, got invited to the Winter Ball and landed a part in "A Raisin in the Sun". By June, Gonzaga had won my heart and I was a "ZAG for life".

Something you learned at Gonzaga that you've carried with you throughout your life:

Freshman year was filled with "Firsts": snowball fight; minus 16 degree weather; writing a check, (Thank you Judy Winchell Sweeney); dying my hair; eating (in silence) with the basketball team; a party at Fairchild AFB; meeting Pete Yull; bowling and pizza (Thank you Patrick John Reagan). Sophomore year I used an outlawed electrical cord and tripped the main breaker in Madonna; the Kennedy opened; we made beer runs to Idaho; I sneaked into a guys' dorm during Thanksgiving break. Junior year, in psychology class I sat next to a member of the Klu Klux Klan. One day he doodled a Klansman, complete with hangman's noose. I don't remember his name, but I do remember Larry Brown promised to protect me. I also attended the funerals of four Gonzaga students. We thought we were invincible, until we realized we weren't. Senior year I interned in Oakland, CA, completing my requirements for a BS in Medical Technology. Academically, spiritually and morally, GU made me the person I am today.

Life's highlights since graduation:

I married Morris Soublet, Jr., the oldest of 10 kids, in 1969. Our daughters Monica (1970) and Erika (1972) captured our hearts, brightened our days, greyed our hair and depleted our bank account. In 1988 Monica became a Fresno State Bulldog. Erika continued the GU Bulldog tradition in 1990. Morris was a Catholic school teacher for over 30 years while I worked as a Medical Technologist at Kaiser Hospital in Oakland for 42 years. After our girls left home we expanded our travels. We've driven cross country twice, toured Western Canada by train, cruised from Quebec to Boston and round trip from San Francisco to Hawaii. 
