Facility to greatly expand fitness options; operation to be self-sufficient

When Gonzaga's new Student Fitness Center opens in March, students will have a state-of-the-art workout facility, said Chris Standiford, associate athletic director who oversees facilities.

"Careful thought and investigation have gone into what others in higher education and the fitness industry have done, and we have modeled our facility after the successes others have realized," Standiford said. "We will continue to monitor equipment and space usage after the center is up and running, and will continue to select new equipment and use space based upon the needs of our students."

The Fitness Center will include the pool, the Field House and the new weights/cardiовascular facility being built on the west side of the pool. There will be one point of entry, off of the main Atrium between the pool and the Field House. The facility will be staffed by full-time fitness managers and student assistants who are paid out of the revenue generated by the Center. Initial plans include offering such special services as nutritional counseling and fitness assessments. Each undergraduate student will be assessed a \$75 fee each semester. It will be determined whether all graduate and law students will pay the fee, or whether only those who wish to use it will be charged. A summer usage fee has yet to be decided.

Administration has yet to decide if a usage fee will be charged to faculty and staff who use the Fitness Center, which includes the pool, the locker rooms, running track, racquetball and basketball courts in the Field House and the new Dance Studio. Locker rooms will be located where the current pool lockers sit. There will no longer be general-use locker

rooms in the Pavilion side of Martin Centre.

"The architecture is such that the Fitness Center will be self-contained, and the Atrium will separate it from the Pavilion, which will be used by athletics and physical education. The current weight room and basketball courts in the Pavilion will be used exclusively by intercollegiate athletes, physical education students and for special events," Standiford said.

The outdoor corridor separating the pool and Field House will be glassed in, and provide room for a juice bar and light exercise. Entry to the Field House, pool, the new weights/cardiовascular areas and the locker rooms will be through this new Atrium only. On the first floor of the Fitness Center will be free weights, as well as cardiовascular machines including stair steppers, treadmills, elliptical machines and a variety of exercise bikes. A stereo system will pipe in music. The second floor will include cardiовascular machines, circuit weights, and TV sets, Standiford said. There will be an entrance onto the running track from the second floor. Two new dance/exercise rooms will occupy space previously housing racquetball courts in the Field House. Four racquetball courts will be retained on the south end of the Field House.

"The most impressive feature of the new Fitness Center will be the openness," said Athletic Director Mike Roth. "There will be

glass windows separating the pool from the cardio/weights area, and windows from the new Atrium into both the pool to the north and the Field House to the south. In addition, there will be huge windows on the west side of the Fitness Center bringing light into the workout area and the pool. I think this feature alone will make this facility very attractive to its users."

The Fitness Center is expected to increase its open hours from 94 hours a week to between 105-120 per week, Roth said. The additional hours are made possible by the revenue from the users fees.

"The operation of the facility must pay for itself," said Charles Murphy, vice president for finance. "We picked \$75 as a starting point for a semester's fee. We'll see how we are able to meet costs of maintaining and operating the facility."

Committee seeking input on speakers policy

An Input Committee has been appointed by President Robert Spitzer, S.J., to solicit ideas from the Gonzaga community on the University's Speakers Policy. Committee members will seek input early this fall, identifying key issues and beginning discussions on how to shape such a policy. A preliminary report will be prepared and submitted to an Ad Hoc Committee of the Board of Trustees. The Input Committee will submit a final report for review by the Trustees by the end of fall semester.

Powel goes high-tech

Wayne Powell has another new job.

He went from associate professor of psychology to associate academic vice president, to acting academic vice president to associate academic vice president/chief information officer. Gonzaga has not previously had a CIO.

In his current role, Powell is responsible for the development and maintenance of technology on campus. That includes office computing equipment, administrative systems, and instructional technology. He charts a strategic course for technology that helps the University meet its overall strategic goals. And he also develops resources for technology.

Other recent changes in the academic vice president's office include: appointment of Associate Professor of Teacher Education Deborah McDonald as associate AVP for academic programs and faculty support and enrichment; Dean of Financial Services Thayne McCulloh as associate AVP for productivity and efficiency, accreditation review and strategic planning; and executive assistant to the president Father Del Skillingstad, S.J., as executive assistant to the AVP. Scott Bozman, who served one year as acting associate AVP, will return to the classroom as associate professor of business.

Classroom technology increasing

Faculty will have state-of-the-art multimedia capabilities in 10 more classrooms this fall, thanks to summer work performed by Information Technology and Plant Services staff.

The new technology will provide professors and their students with large screen display for VHS and DVD video, a document display camera, access to computer data and the Internet, and the ability to use PowerPoint—all designed to enhance teaching and learning. "Emphasis is on 'user friendly' interface to make the technology easy to use," said Dale deViveiros, ITS director.

On an ongoing basis, ITS will provide training in how to operate the technology.

Three Administration Building rooms were equipped: Ad 242, 244, and 246. Last summer Ad 203 and 314 were so equipped. Additionally, ITS is in the process of adding multimedia capability to Jepson 113, Schoenberg 106, 201 and 202. This fall, Rosauer 112, 114, and 130 also will become multimedia classrooms. ITS has also installed new state-of-the-art presentation technology in Jundt Auditorium.

Classes added to handle the load

The College of Arts and Sciences has added 18 classes this fall to accommodate recent large classes of new students. The classes are primarily in the thought and expression block (English composition, speech and critical thinking). Classes also have been added in lower division English, religion, history and other areas.

"We have three 'new' tenure-track faculty, as well as a small number of term additions. The rest of the courses are being covered by adjuncts," said Robert Prusch, CAS dean. The new faculty positions are in sociology, math and political science.

Construction Update

Several projects nearing completion

Phase 1 of the Hughes Hall expansion will be complete next summer. If funding comes through, Phase 2 would start next summer and continue into the spring 2004, said Ken Sammons, director of plant services. Herak Center will be available for fall classes, with some first-floor work on the new east and west entries continuing into September. The Student Fitness Center is to be completed in early March.

The Student Chapel remodel will be complete by early October. The stained glass windows are in, but the custom frames to hold them are not yet ready for installation. Several classrooms around

Campus are receiving new technology upgrades, to provide enhanced instructional capability and flexibility.

Crosby Center first and second floors are being remodeled to accommodate expanded student offices. Alliance and Lincoln halls received new vinyl windows this summer.

Swimming in the fast Lane

When Virginia Lane arrived at Gonzaga in 2000, she had her books under one arm and her swimming suit under the other.

As assistant professor of Religious Studies and director of Clinical Pastoral Education, and a part-time assistant pastor at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, her time was well consumed. But somehow she found time to begin a regular swimming regimen in the Martin Centre pool that this summer led to two third, two fourth, two fifth and one seventh place finish in the Canadian Masters National Swim Competition, 55-59-year-old division, in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.

"Not bad for an old gal," she quipped. "For me, swimming is a very enjoyable and life-giving experience and definitely helps to ground me in my sense of being. I try to encourage others to engage in regular exercise. . . not just of the brain/intellect, but of the whole being."

Now her goal is 'gold' when she is 75.

She swims nearly every event, from a 50-meter backstroke to a 1,500-meter freestyle, and nearly every distance in between, including the 100-meter butterfly.

But for now, it's back to the classroom where she prepares students for careers as hospital chaplains.

navigation menu on every page of the site, and a bread crumb trail on every page to help users find their way back up the site structure.

In the near future, the web site will include an interactive campus map and campus tour.

Activity on the new site indicates significant interest by users. In July, more than 68,000 unique visitors viewed the site at least once, and more than 1 million individual pages were viewed on the site. On average, each visitor to the site stayed there for 12 minutes and viewed 14 pages. Finally, an average of almost 32,000 pages were viewed each day.

Land offer made for parking lot, trail head

Gonzaga unveiled plans to pave paradise and put up a parking lot.

Well, not really. The University tentatively has agreed to purchase about 4 acres of land from the City of Spokane, just south of Trent and the former Postal Annex, on which it will build a parking lot and a trail head for the Centennial Trail.

This purchase is contingent upon the Washington State Office of Financial Management's approval to use the \$1.5 million appropriated in March by the Legislature for use on the Inland Northwest Regional Sports and Recreation Project, which includes GU's new arena. Gonzaga officials intend to purchase the property for \$845,000, then use the remaining grant

money to build the parking lot, create a paved Centennial Trail spur from the east end of the Kardong Bridge to the trail head, and beautify the Spokane River bank along the way. Gonzaga would have first priority to use the parking lot for arena events.

A governing board would be established to oversee use of the parking lot and trail head, consisting of three Gonzaga representatives and three from Friends of the Centennial Trail.

Many downtown events centered around the Centennial Trail could be staged from this trail head. Currently, no such trail head exists anywhere downtown.

Construction could begin as early as spring 2003.

Campus cozy to more students

About 2,150 students will be living in University housing this fall, the largest number ever. Part of that is due to the large increase in freshman enrollment over the past four years, said Housing Director Dennis Colestock. But Beth Hellwig-Olson, dean of student services, said the desire of students to stay connected with friends and the development of Dussault, Burch, and Corkery apartments have made staying on campus more desirable in recent years, as well.

Colestock also believes that more parents are postponing that age at which they allow their children to have cars at school. This phenomena is forcing students to choose accommodations closer to their classes.

Enrollment to top 5,300, including more than 900 freshmen

Enrollment is expected to increase to over 5,300 students this fall, an all-time high, said Registrar Jolanta Kozyra. That will eclipse last fall's record 5,206 total enrollment. While officials do not anticipate a record freshman class this fall, more than 900 freshmen are expected to enroll this week. Last fall GU enrolled a record 971.

Full-time undergraduate tuition for the year is \$19,400, up from \$18,300 last year. Other tuition fees per credit hour are: law, \$720; doctoral, \$535; master's, \$495; \$300 for BGS; undergraduate part-time, \$560.
